RURAL AND REMOTE MEMORY CLINIC (RRMC) - Visit our website

About the RRMC: The RaDAR team implemented the <u>specialist Rural and Remote Memory Clinic (RRMC)</u> in 2004, to provide diagnosis and management of atypical and complex cases of suspected dementia. The one-stop interdisciplinary clinic streamlines the assessment process by coordinating a complete team assessment and feedback on one day, and uses Telehealth videoconferencing for follow-up appointments. The specialist RRMC was started as a research project and now receives funding from the Saskatchewan Ministry of Health to provide clinical services to Saskatchewan residents.

RRMC News: Since our return to in-person appointments, we continue to use lessons learned during COVID. For example, when appropriate, patients are offered the option for follow-up appointment to be done via web-conferencing to lessen travel burden.

At the end of the summer, Dr. Ivan Panyavin's term with the clinic was completed and the RRMC welcomed August Kortzman to the team. We plan to feature this news in the next edition.

So far this year from Jan 1 to Sept 20 the RRMC saw 35 patients (along with 33 family members or care partners), in-person in Saskatoon for an Initial clinic visit. Five patients (along with 5 family members or care partners) were seen in-person in Saskatoon for an annual review appointment, and 25 patients (along with 28 family members or care partners) were seen virtually via web conferencing for their team-based annual review appointment.

What's been happening lately at the RaDAR rural memory clinics? Let's hear from Chelsie on the ground!



- I attended 4 memory clinics in 3 communities between August 1 and September 20 where teams met with a total of 7 patients and families, all patients were new patients.
- Lampman held their first memory clinic in September. The new team, led by NP Lois Coffey, has done a fantastic job getting the memory clinics up and running.

The team held a half day clinic to get their feet wet and to ensure the team was confident in their roles before holding a full day. The half day went extremely well, and the patient and family were very thankful at the end of the clinic.

• The Esterhazy Team has been extremely consistent holding a clinic every month since their inception. The team has made a few changes to ensure the flow of their day is working smoothly and keeping patient experience and timing at the forefront of their clinic.

UNIVERSITY OF SASKATCHEWAN RaD 1-day memory clinics have been established in 7 communities: BENEFITS

Teams are led by a family physician or nurse practitioner and may include home care, social work, occupational therapy, physical therapy, pharmacy, dietitian, and Alzheimer Society First Link Coordinator.

• Resources. We ensure teams receive necessary tech resources. Teams use EMR templates for patient assessments that are based on Canadian consensus guidelines for dementia diagnosis and treatment.

• Ongoing support. Teams receive shadowing opportunities, peer mentorship, operational support, training, and continuing education on dementia-related topics. The specialist RaDAR Rural and Remote Memory Clinic in Saskatoon offers additional assessment and interventions for patients/families.


Megan Tomilin has started her PhD Program. Her project is "Serum Proteomics and Clinical Outcomes following ST-Elevation Myocardial Infarction".

Daniel Chao has started his honours project in the Mass Spectrometry Laboratory for Omics Research in September under Dr. Katselis' supervision. His honours project will be part of the ongoing microconcussions and vibration exposure work with a focus on the proteomic changes in the brain after vibration exposure.
