Every fall for the last 7 years, Dr. Debra Morgan has hosted the Summit of the **Knowledge Network in Rural and Remote** Dementia Care in Saskatoon. This event is a chance for people from all over Saskatchewan interested in dementia care to get together for an evening poster session followed by a full conference day. All of the posters and presentations focus on individuals with dementia and their



families living in rural and remote communities. This year, 70 people from across

Alzheimer Society of Saskatchewan at Summit 7, including First Link Coordinators Saskatchewan and elsewhere

attended Summit. Representatives from Sun Country Health Region included Pat Kessler (Director of Home Care and Palliative Care), Erica Matthews (Social Worker), and Gina Mathieson-Selinger (First Link Coordinator, pictured below).

Dr. Anthea Innes, Professor and

Director of the Bournemouth University Dementia Institute (BUDI), was the



Dr. Anthea Innes Summit 7 keynote speaker. As a leading researcher in the field of dementia care, Anthea is passionate about improving the lives of those with dementia and their families. Much of her research engages community members and those living with dementia to support the public engagement of individuals with dementia, build dementia friendly communities, enhance services, education and training for health care

providers, and include people with dementia in tourism, leisure, arts, and culture.

The afternoon

session of Summit focused on A Multi-Method Investigation of Dementia and Related Services in Saskatchewan: Final Report and Recommendations. Summit participants worked in small groups to revise and rank the 10 initial report recommendations. The study was a partnership between the Health Quality Council and the RaDAR team, with Dr. Jacqueline Quail of HQC responsible for the hands-on data analysis. The study was guided by a 19-member Steering Committee (including Pat Kessler and Sheena Grimes from Sun Country Health Region). The 170-plus page report includes a best practice


review, prevalence and incidence of dementia for the entire province (plus each health region), and findings from an environmental scan of dementia-related

Sun Country Dementia Working Group

The Sun Country Dementia Working Group has been meeting since June, 2013. This group also serves as the RaDAR Advisory Council for the health region, as well as the Alzheimer Society of Saskatchewan Dementia Advisory Network. The overall goals of this group are to improve services for individuals with dementia and their families as well as raise pubic awareness, in the health region and across Saskatchewan.

What is RaDAR doing in Sun Country Health Region?

The RaDAR team recently became part of a national research initiative, the Canadian Consortium in Neurodegeneration in Aging (CCNA). The Consortium was announced by the federal government and the Canadian Institutes of Health Research in

September, 2014, to address the growing prevalence of neurodegenerative diseases affecting cognition, such as Alzheimer Disease and other dementias. The Consortium brings together 340 researchers across 20 research teams, organized into 3 themes (prevention, treatment, care).

Dr. Morgan, lead of the RaDAR team, also co-leads Team 20 of the Consortium. Team 20 focuses on rural and Indigenous issues in dementia care, with the rural focus led by Dr. Morgan and the Indigenous focus co-led by Dr. Kristen Jacklin (Northern Ontario School of Medicine, Laurentian University) and Dr.

Carrie Bourassa (First Nations University, SK). The rural and Indigenous

> research streams are distinct but

address three common research areas in dementia care: community-based primary health care (PHC), appropriate tools, and capacity building.

As part of CCNA Team 20, RaDAR will conduct 3 inter-related projects in Sun Country Health Region:

- 1. Our core project will involve working with PHC teams to develop, implement, and evaluate approaches to improve dementia care. We will start in Sun Country Health Region, with plans to scale up to other regions by the end of the 5-year project in 2019.
- A pilot project led by Dr. Julie
 Kosteniuk will look at developing
 standardized care pathways and
 clinical support tools for rural PHC
 professionals.
- A pilot project led by Dr. Megan
 O'Connell will develop innovative
 ways that specialists (from our
 Memory Clinic) can support and
 help build dementia care capacity in
 rural PHC providers, and provide
 diagnostic support to PHC providers.

Baseline data collection for RaDAR's core project for CCNA Team 20 will involve interviews with 4 members from each PHC team in Sun Country Health Region, plus 2 patient-caregiver dyads from each PHC team. Data collection with the 8 PHC teams is expected to begin early next year (2015).

Kathleen Kulyk, a nursing Masters student, supervised by Dr. Norma Stewart and Dr. Shelley Peacock, will soon be conducting a pilot study in Saskatoon Health Region to test the feasibility, acceptability, and validity of the questionnaires that will be used in the baseline data collection. Kathleen will be interviewing 4 health care professionals from 3 different PHC teams in rural areas of Saskatoon Health Region.
