#### **Spotlight on Leslie Holfeld**

Leslie is a registered nurse who has held the position of Rural and Remote Memory Clinic coordinator since the clinic was first established in 2004. As part of this role, Leslie books patient appointments and

conducts pre-clinic assessments. She also coordinates the many procedures done on clinic day and guides patients through their all-day visit. Leslie fields phone calls from patients and caregivers dealing with issues related to dementia and directs them to appropriate resources if required. She also coordinates follow-up telehealth appointments between patients and telehealth sites. In addition, Leslie regularly refers patients and caregivers to the Alzheimer Society of Saskatchewan and ensures that the Learning Series telehealth sessions are publicized.

# RaDAR in Sun Country Health Region

#### **Update**

Thank you to everyone who participated in a baseline interview. We recently completed Phase 1 with a total of 32 baseline interviews in Sun Country, including 9 decision-makers, 5 patients/caregivers, and 18 PHC team members.

The objective of Phase 1 was to learn more about individuals' views regarding dementia assessment, diagnosis, and management, particularly current gaps and strengths in care pathways in the health region. We expect that strengths in care pathways will increase as a result of our 5-year research partnership with the health region.

Our core project in Phase 2 is now underway. In the coming months, one Primary Health Care team in the health region will take part in an Information Session and Education Session with Dr. Dallas Seitz and the RaDAR team. These sessions will allow the PHC team to learn more about PC-DATA (Primary Care Dementia Assessment and Treatment Algorithm), a set of knowledge tools for health care professionals based on recommendations from the Canadian Consensus Conference on the Diagnosis and Treatment of Dementia.

RaDAR will then work with the first PHC team to implement and evaluate PC-DATA and additional best practices in dementia care.

- CCNA (Canadian Consortium in Neurodegeneration in Aging) is based at the Lady Davis Institute of the Jewish General Hospital, McGill University.
- CCNA brings together 340 researchers across 20 research teams, organized into 3 themes (prevention, treatment, care).
- Other care-oriented CCNA teams are examining issues of dementia and multi-morbidity, gerontechnology, driving, caregiving, and the health care system.
