Message from Debra

This newsletter is a way of staying connected with the members of the Knowledge Network in Rural and Remote Dementia Care over the year and describing some of the activities going on. A new development in the last few months was the announcement by the Canadian Institutes of Health Research of a new research initiative in **Community-Based Primary Healthcare** (CBPHC). The two priority areas for this program are Better Systems for Chronic Disease Management and Access to Appropriate Care for Vulnerable Populations. Given the fit with our research in rural and remote dementia care, we are working toward an application due January 2012. To plan for this we are holding a meeting in mid-October before the Summit to bring together researchers, our international partners, and key stakeholders to identify research priorities and potential models of rural community-based primary healthcare. The Summit will provide an opportunity to bring the results of this planning session to Knowledge Network members, to continue to develop interventions and programs aimed at meeting the needs of rural patients, families, and healthcare providers.

Dr. Janice Keefe - Assistant Professor in the department of Gerontology at Mount Saint Vincent University is the **invited keynote** presenter for the 2011 Summit. Dr. Keefe's research interests include infor-

mal caregiving, specifically work and elder care, financial compensation and assessment, human resources issues, rural aging, and continuing care policy.

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Summit 2010 project updates

At the 2010 Summit, focused discussion groups were hosted to provide researchers some feedback on their projects. Here is updated information on the status of each project.

Development and Evaluation of a Telehealth-Delivered Exercise Intervention - Vanina Dal Bello-Haas

We have just begun our small scale pilot study of a tele-delivered exercise intervention program for people with memory problems who live in rural or remote areas. We have 2 families for a total of 4 participants who will be attending from one telehealth site outside of Saskatoon. We have conducted our pre-testing and have coordinated with Telehealth Saskatchewan to conduct the twice weekly sessions in the month of June. Engagement, acceptability, and feasibility will be assessed with audiotaped telehealth interviews post-intervention. In addition, each participant will other measures including measures of fitness, physical activity, mood, and quality of life post-intervention.

Dementia Diagnosis and Management - Julie Kosteniuk

The purpose of this research project is to explore the assessment and management of people with dementia by family physicians and nurse practitioners in rural and remote Saskatchewan. As part of this project, we conducted a pilot study with 14 family physicians (FPs) and nurse practitioners (NPs) in early 2010. Since last year's summit, we have conducted a subsequent study with 15 family physicians who had referred one or more patients to the Rural and Remote Memory Clinic.

The results suggest that FPs would like to see more collaborative models in practice, particularly those that include a nurse or one other healthcare professional trained specifically in dementia care. We also found that FPs acknowledged both disadvantages and advantages of practicing rural, with drawbacks focused on physical distance from healthcare services and benefits centred around social proximity to healthcare workers, patients, and people close to patients

Our next steps are focused on developing a comprehensive program of intervention research focused on innovative models of rural and remote community-based healthcare that will improve access to appropriate prevention and intervention strategies.

Caregiver Needs Assessment - Sheena Walls-Ingram

This study is aimed at improving our understanding of the experiences of family caregivers and the supports and services needed to help them in their role. Sheena Walls-Ingram is the Research Manager for this study, which commenced in April 2010. To date, the caregiver(s) of 31 patients have been enrolled and have participated in an initial interview on clinic day. Sixteen of those participants have completed a six-month follow-up interview, and one has completed an (in-person) one-year follow-up interview.

New caregivers will continue to be enrolled in the study until we feel we have a comprehensive understanding of the rural caregiving experience from diagnosis to one-year follow-up. We will continue to conduct six-month and one year follow-up interviews with currently enrolled participants until at least June 2012. Analysis is ongoing.

2010 Summit member wins Saskatchewan Union of Nurses (SUN) *Patients and Families First Challenge* prize for her work.

Donna Dalziel, a panel member of last year's Summit afternoon panel discussion Frontotemporal Dementia Caregivers Telehealth Support Group, has been awarded \$10 000 by SUN. Donna and her friend Steven Kowal designed "activity centres" for people with dementia, and with the help of friend Barb Steen they piloted the activity centres in one long-term care facility in Prince Albert.

Evaluating Summit 2011 as a Knowledge Translation tool


