RURAL AND REMOTE MEMORY CLINIC (RRMC)



About the RRMC: The RaDAR team implemented the specialist Rural and Remote Memory Clinic (RRMC) in 2004, to provide diagnosis and management of atypical and complex cases of suspected dementia. The one-stop interdisciplinary clinic streamlines the assessment process by coordinating a complete team assessment and feedback on one day, and uses Telehealth videoconferencing for follow-up appointments. The specialist RRMC was started as a research project and now receives funding from the

Saskatchewan Ministry of Health to provide clinical services to Saskatchewan residents.

RRMC News: Since our return to in-person appointments, we continue to use lessons learned during COVID. For example, when appropriate, patients are offered the option for follow-up appointment to be done via web-conferencing to lessen travel burden.

What's been happening lately at the RaDAR rural memory clinics? Let's hear from Chelsie on the ground!



- There were 6 memory clinics held in 4 communities between September 20 and Nov 28 where teams met with a total of 8 patients and families, all patients were new patients.
- Lampman held their second memory clinic in November. The new team now has two memory clinics under their belts and are looking forward to holding more in the new year.
- In October the Esterhazy Team was gracious enough to take part in a video that will be produced by Honey Cut Studios. The video will be three to five minutes long and will include a summary of what goes on in the memory clinics as well as some individual interviews with some of the team members. The video will be used to help spread the word about our rural memory clinics.

BENEFITS

- Team-based interprofessional care.

 Teams are led by a family physician or nurse practitioner and may include home care, social work, occupational therapy, physical therapy, pharmacy, dietitian, and Alzheimer Society First Link Coordinator.
- Resources. We ensure teams receive necessary tech resources. Teams use EMR templates for patient assessments that are based on Canadian consensus guidelines for dementia diagnosis and treatment.
- Ongoing support. Teams receive shadowing opportunities, peer mentorship, operational support, training, and continuing education on dementia-related topics. The specialist RaDAR Rural and Remote Memory Clinic in Saskatoon offers additional assessment and interventions for patients/families.





Alejandra Castillo Toro, Brooke Thompson and Shelley Kirychuk attended the Symposium on antibiotic resistance on bioaerosols at Institut Universitaire de Cardiologie et de Pneumologie de Québec (IUCPQ) in Quebec City, QC from November 1st to 2nd as part of the NSERC Frontiers Project. Dr. Caroline Duchaine opened the Symposium with the unveiling of a plaque commemorating Dr. Yvon Cormier's contribution to the growth of bioaerosols research and messages from Drs. Shelley Kirychuk, Yohan Bossé (Director of IUCPQ Research Centre), and François Maltais (Head of the multidisciplinary Department of Pulmonology and Surgery, IUCPQ). Dr. Abia King from the University of KwaZulu and Dr. Simon Otto from the University of Alberta were two keynote speakers for the event. Students and investigators had the opportunity to give short presentations on the results of their projects.

Alejandra Castillo Toro stayed in Quebec City for 3 weeks to complete 16S PCR, an ARG panel and sequencing in Dr. Caroline Duchaine's Lab at IUCPQ.

Ibrahim Hoja's project is titled Nutritional Determinants and Genetic Factors Influencing the Circadian Clock and Oral Tissues Development and Diseases".

Lucas Julseth continues to work on the microconcussions and vibration exposure project. Lucas' focus is on the cognitive changes after vibration exposure and proteomic changes in serum of rats.

Daniel Chao is continuing to work on his Honour's project focusing on proteomic changes in the brains of rats that have been exposed to vibration frequencies and comparing to those of rats who were not exposed to vibration frequencies (quiet controls).

The RaDAR research program has two main streams, the specialist Rural and Remote Memory Clinic

(RRMC), and the rural primary healthcare memory clinics, and is led by Dr. Debra Morgan. The Knowledge Network in Rural and Remote Dementia Care guides the RaDAR research program and includes people living with dementia and family members, and other stakeholders. The Network meets at the annual Rural Dementia Care Summit, the RaDAR team's key knowledge exchange event. The 16th annual Summit meeting was held virtually on November 21st & 22nd. Over 180 individuals registered to attend the two-day online event. Our busiest live-delivered session during Summit had a maximum of 98 participants online with us live!

The Cognitive Kitchen - Dr. Allison Cammer, PhD, RD, College of Pharmacy and Nutrition

Dr. Allison Cammer is an investigator with the RaDAR team whose research program centers on nutrition and dementia. One project currently underway is The Cognitive Kitchen - - read on to learn more!

This evidence-based program was codesigned by RaDAR team members and patient-family partners. It is being offered both virtually and in-person for adults 55+ and care partners of people living with dementia. Each session in the six-part series includes a hands-on food preparation component and discussion on strategies to support dementia risk reduction and living well with dementia. Ingredients are provided for in-person sessions and

ingredient reimbursement of up to \$50 per session is available for virtual programs. Participants must be living in Saskatchewan and priority is given to those living in rural areas.

Virtual sessions will continue to be offered from January-July 2024. In-person sessions will resume in the spring of 2024 and will be held in communities within a 150 km radius of Yorkton, SK. Programs are being scheduled based on participant interest and availability, so register now to be the first to know when one is available to suit your preferences!

The Cognitive Kitchen is funded in part by the Government of Canada's New Horizons for Seniors Program.

The First Nations Mental Health Project



The First Nations Mental Health project is well underway! Since July, the team has been collecting survey data from community members of Beardy's and Okemasis Cree Nation and Montreal Lake Cree Nation. This study is collecting information to see the connections between house, home, and mental health in these two rural Saskatchewan First Nations. We planned a survey blitz in Montreal Lake on October 17th & 18th to kick start data collection in that community. Key members of our team at Montreal Lake and Little Red include

Larry Burgess (Director, William Charles Health Centre), Erica Stockdale, Tina Nelson, Glenda Henderson, Jacqueline Natomagan, and Roy Charles. With the support of the band council, health centre, local health workers and even some taxi drivers, word about the event spread well beyond our expectations.

The CCRAH team of Research Assistants—Meera Kachroo, Jill Dosman, Erica Stockdale, Shirmin Bintay, Marie Neubuhr, along with co-Investigator Dr. Chandima Karunanayake (as pictured below)—drove up to Montreal Lake for the two-day blitz. Participants met the research team, filled surveys, had coffee & lunch, and enjoyed community. The arena may have been a little cold, but the atmosphere was warm! Supporting the event were Montreal Lake Mental Health Counsellors Stephen Stamp and Tamara Roberts. Stephen also brought us a local delicacy to sample: moose nose!







Building For the Future: Housing and Health Forum

The meeting provided a forum for researchers, industry partners, and local/provincial/federal policy writers to listen to First Nations and Metis community members about their lived experience and preferred pathways for changing the built environment that reflects Indigenous ways. Through this forum, we facilitated knowledge-to-action as determined by First Nations and Metis people. We identified barriers to Indigenous built environment and levers for change. In combination, these outcomes are supporting the development of a framework for research, knowledge blending, policy action, and engagement driven by First **Nations and Metis community** members, professional builders, policy makers, and researchers working on the built environment.
