



Access to Low Back Pain Care: The Saskatchewan Landscape

In February, Drs Brenna Bath and Stacey Lovo, hosted two knowledge translation events (one in-person and one virtually) focused on access to back pain care in Saskatchewan. There was a total of 57 participants over the course of both events. These events showcased our research findings from interviews with over 40 people with chronic low back pain and health care providers, as well as a telephone survey of nearly 400 Saskatchewan residents with chronic low back pain. Panel presentations from both patient-partner and health care provider team members also provided lived experience and insight into access and provision of low back pain care in Saskatchewan. The second part of the events was an interactive World Café facilitated discussion with and among attendees to generate ideas for recommendations and actionable change to improve access to low back pain care in the province and beyond. Thank you to everyone who attended.

RURAL AND REMOTE MEMORY CLINIC (RRMC)

The RaDAR team implemented the specialist Rural and Remote Memory Clinic (RRMC) in 2004, to provide diagnosis and management of atypical and complex cases of suspected dementia. The one-stop interdisciplinary clinic streamlines the assessment process by coordinating a complete team assessment and feedback on one day, and uses Telehealth videoconferencing for follow-up appointments. The specialist RRMC was started as a research project and now receives funding from the Saskatchewan Ministry of Health to provide clinical services to Saskatchewan residents.

Due to COVID-19, the specialist RRMC adapted our method of providing services to the community by remotely delivering clinical services and interventions. Patients and family members meet with our interdisciplinary team virtually, using secure web conferencing, or teleconferencing, depending on the technology available to them in their home. The clinic adapted its referral process for health care practitioners as well to better meet their needs during the pandemic. The team has recently returned to in-person appointments while maintaining virtual appointments as an option for team follow-up visits as appropriate.

Since 2004 over 850 patients have been seen in the clinic.

What's been happening lately at the RaDAR rural memory clinics? Let's hear from Chelsie on the ground!



- I attended 3 memory clinics in 3 communities between June 1 and July 31 where teams met with a total of 5 patients and families. All patients were new patients.
- Esterhazy held their second memory clinic in July. The new team, led by Dr Nel, has done a fantastic job getting the memory clinics up and

running. The team has been tirelessly working together to find the perfect flow for their day to ensure all necessary assessments get completed and the patient and family are sent home with a diagnosis and recommendations.

- The Weyburn Clinic recently started accepting patients referred from outside the clinic. The last two patients were both referrals and the team has created an excellent format to ensure the patients feel comfortable when working with the team.

RaDAR memory clinics meet a need for dementia care close to home

1-day memory clinics have been established in 7 communities: Kipling, Weyburn, Bengough, Carlyle, Maryfield, Lampman, and Esterhazy

BENEFITS

- Team-based interprofessional care. Teams are led by a family physician or nurse practitioner and may include home care, social work, occupational therapy, physical therapy, pharmacy, dietitian, and Alzheimer Society First Link Coordinator.
- Resources. We ensure teams receive necessary tech resources. Teams use EMR templates for patient assessments that are based on Canadian consensus guidelines for dementia diagnosis and treatment.
- Ongoing support. Teams receive shadowing opportunities, peer mentorship, operational support, training, and continuing education on dementia-related topics. The specialist RaDAR Rural and Remote Memory Clinic in Saskatoon offers additional assessment and interventions for patients/families.



OCCUPATIONAL HYGIENE AND HEALTH LABORATORY

Alejandra Castillo Toro and Brooke Thompson are extracting DNA from bioaerosol samples collected at swine and poultry facilities from around Saskatchewan. She will also perform 16S qPCR on the collected samples and travel to University of Laval in the fall to complete the antibiotic resistance gene panels and sequencing on the samples.

MASS SPECTROMETRY LABORATORY FOR OMICS RESEARCH

Daniel Chao will be starting his honours project in the Mass Spectrometry Laboratory for Omics Research in September under Dr. Katselis' supervision. He will be working with Lucas Julseth on the vibration exposures in an animal model. Daniel was awarded a NSERC URSA for the summer of 2023 and worked as a summer student in the lab until the end of August.

The RaDAR research program is led by Dr. Debra Morgan and guided by The Knowledge **Network in Rural** and Remote



Rural Health Laboratory

<u>First Nations Mental Health Study</u>

The overall goals of this project are to assess house (Washahikan) and home (Mikiwam) as determinants of mental health outcomes in First Nations people; and to determine the effects of addressing and redressing issues involved in house, home, and mental health. We will evaluate the characteristics of the house, the home, and social determinants of Indigenous peoples' mental health at baseline and following interventions.

The survey on House, Home and Mental Health began on July 17, 2023. There was a "meet and greet" session and many people showed up to complete the survey. Two First Nations Communities are taking part.

CURRENTLY RECRUITING: Feasibility and Acceptability of a Physiotherapist Led Education and Exercise Program for People with Osteoarthritis Awaiting Hip or Knee Total Joint Arthroplasty.

Wait times for hip and knee joint replacement surgery in Saskatchewan are the longest in Canada and have grown even longer during the Covid-19 pandemic. Education and exercise management are recommended internationally as key treatment approaches for people with hip and knee osteoarthritis (OA) prior to surgery.

This project is evaluating the feasibility and acceptability of a physiotherapist-led education and exercise program for people who are awaiting hip or knee replacement surgery. Participants in our study are enrolled in the Craven SPORT Services 8-week beginner osteoarthritis exercise class. Prior to starting the class, participants are asked to complete a series of questionnaires to provide background information on their health, mobility, function, and quality of life; this is followed by a short functional assessment. Participants then start the 8-week exercise class and complete the sessions to the best of their ability. After the exercise class has finished, participants complete the same questionnaires and functional movements again. This gives us an idea of changes and possible improvements that may have occurred.

We are still accepting patients for this study. You must currently be on the elective surgical wait list

for a single joint hip or knee replacement and cannot have previously taken the Craven SPORT Services osteoarthritis exercise program.
