CCNA Phase 2 is focused on improving dementia management and quality of life for people with dementia and their families. Team 15, led by **Drs. Megan O'Connell and Debra Morgan**, focuses on dementia care for rural populations.

Dr. O'Connell is leading an interdisciplinary team in the development of **RRMC-interventions** (**RRMCi**), a suite of psychological interventions to be delivered remotely via Telehealth across rural Saskatchewan.

Dr. Morgan and Dr. Julie Kosteniuk are continuing to collaborate with rural Primary Health Care teams to develop and adapt the *Rural Primary Health Care Model for Dementia*. Three teams have established 1-day memory clinics in Kipling, Weyburn, Rural West (Bengough and Radville). The Carlyle team has also recently joined the study. Team compositions vary by location and include a variety of interprofessional care providers.

Current and Ongoing RaDAR Research with PHC Teams

RaDAR Postdoctoral Fellow **Dr. Melanie Bayly** and new faculty member **Dr. Amanda Froehlich Chow** are continuing their work in southeast Saskatchewan.

Dr. Bayly is exploring **patient and family experiences with the 1-day memory clinics**. Patient and family experiences have been very positive to date. Local rural-based care, an interprofessional team format, positive team functioning, a patient/family centered approach, and informative communication appear to be key elements to the success of the rural memory clinics.

Dr. Froehlich Chow is examining **team-based approaches to chronic disease management** in older adults in usual care and in the 1-day memory clinics. Preliminary findings have shown that collaborative care was the most efficient and effective way to deliver care although this approach was not always possible.

Drs. Kosteniuk and Morgan are currently co-leading four projects related to **spreading and sustaining** the RaDAR Rural PHC Memory Clinics, and **outcome studies** to explore impact of the rural PHC memory clinics on patients and families


